Every business, no matter how small or large, has a legal and moral responsibility to care for the health and safety of their workforce and to ensure that they go home safe at the end of the working day.

An Occupational Health and Safety Management System (OHSMS) is a coordinated and systematic approach to managing health and safety risks. You need to adopt a systematic approach to ensure that important occupational health and safety issues are not overlooked.

An effective OHS/WHS Management System should contain 5 key elements that form a continual cycle of improvement:

- · Management commitment and policy
- Planning
- Implementation
- Measurement and evaluation
- Review and improvement

Organisations worldwide recognise the need to control and improve health and safety performance and do so with an OHS/WHS management system as a first step. An occupational health and safety management system promotes a safe and healthy working environment by providing a framework that helps your team to: consistently identify and control health and safety risks; reduce the potential for accidents; aid legislative compliance; and improve overall performance.
